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Dear Parents/Carers,

At St John's we value the use of technology to support our learning and as a way of communicating with others.

On Tuesday 4th February, Year 6 will be having a visit from the Safer Schools and Communities Team to talk about using technology, phones, chatting and gaming. The focus of the talk will be the importance of respectful behaviour online, online bullying and keeping safe online.

It has come to our attention that some pupils in Year 6 are in WhatsApp groups. Unfortunately, some children in the group have not been respectful and have used it to talk inappropriately and unkindly about other children and use bad language. We have also had instances of children messaging others late at night.

As parents it is your responsibility to ensure your children are safe online when they are at home. Obviously our key intention is to ensure that children are safe at all times and we are concerned about some children accessing online material whilst not being supervised. In addition to this, a great deal of school time is being used to solve problems that are not actually taking place in school.

We strongly suggest:

- Phones, tablets and iPads are not in children's rooms at night and that all use of technology is in a shared space such as the kitchen or lounge
- You regularly check your child's internet behaviour and have a clear understanding of what games they are playing/ messaging apps they are using.
- You filter the internet so that your child cannot see harmful or offensive things. This website is very useful <https://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/parents/>
- You teach your child to report anything they see which might be offensive or frightening
- Don't send your child to bed with a mobile device
- Do not download apps which are not age appropriate (Users of WhatsApp should be 13 or over to register)
- Disable chat functions on games
- Teach your child how to screen shot anything worrying or offensive and share worries with a trusted adult immediately.
